RAM RAHMAN

Ram Rahman (b.1955) is an Indian photographer, artist, curator, designer and activist based in Delhi. He was born in 1955 to Indrani Rahman, a classical Indian dancer, and Habib Rahman, a noted Indian architect. He initially studied physics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and later completed a degree in Graphic Design from Yale University's School of Art in 1979.

He is one of the founding members of the Safdar Hashmi Memorial Trust (SAHMAT) in New Delhi, a leader in the resistance to communal and sectarian forces in India through its public cultural action. Rahman is known for his street photographs of India and his environmental portraits. He has exhibited a number of his works in both solo and group shows and has curated several exhibitions. He has also published one book 'Bioscope: Scenes from an Eventful Life', (Bodhi Art, 2008) with Peter Nagy.

With more than 30 independent films to his credit, he has established a very unique impressionistic, free-flowing style of his own. His films and retrospectives have been presented in many forums. Ramani also conducts filmmaking workshops at various film schools, in India. He lives and works from Chennai.





R R SRINIVASAN

R.R. Srinivasan is a multifaceted filmmaker, photographer, and writer who has played a pivotal role in promoting the film appreciation movement in South India. Through his involvement in the film society movement and alternative film journals, he has made significant contributions to bringing serious cinema to a wider audience. Emerging from the Kanchanai Film Society in Thirunelveli, Srinivasan helped introduce non-metropolitan viewers to thought-provoking and impactful films.

He is also a guest lecturer on film, literature, and photography at various universities and colleges. In recent years, he has been exploring the intersection of cinema and visual anthropology, further expanding the boundaries of his creative work.

AMSHAN KUMAR

Amshan Kumar is an acclaimed Indian filmmaker and writer with a deep passion for cinema. His 2015 National Film Award-winning documentary, Yazhpanan Thedchanamoorthy: Music Beyond Boundaries, remains the only Tamil non-fiction film to earn a National Award in the past 17 years. A respected writer, his book Cinema Rasanai, a comprehensive guide to film appreciation, is widely used as a textbook in universities.

He has translated the famous Tamil biography of Subramania Bharati written by Va.Ra into English. It won the Kovai Bharati Pasarai award in 2023. Based in Chennai, Amshan continues to contribute significantly to the Indian and international film landscape.



About the Play

"Naan Savithribaiyai Padikiren" is a solo play performed by P. Arokia Mary Stella, a renowned Tamil theatre actor and senior member of the Yaazh Theatre Group.

The play highlights the life and contributions of Savitribai Phule, India's first female teacher and a social reformer who founded the country's first girls' school. Savitribai challenged social norms by advocating for women's education, speaking against practices like rape and widowhood rituals.

Her forward-thinking actions laid the groundwork for a more equitable society, emphasizing empowerment and education for marginalized communities.

The performance contextualizes her struggles and connects them to contemporary social issues. The play has been presented to a variety of audiences, including teachers, development professionals, and rural communities in Tamil Nadu, and has featured at national theatre festivals and book fairs. It is the first Tamil play to focus on Savitribai's legacy.



About the Actor

Dr. P. Arokiya Mari Stella began her theatrical journey in 2002 as part of her Elective - Softcore syllabus coursework at the Department of Performing Arts, Pondicherry University. She made her acting debut in the play The Museum of History, written by S. Murugaboopathy and directed by Dr. G. Gobi.

She participated in various theater forms, including street plays, theater festivals, and awareness dramas, which allowed her to explore diverse roles. These experiences led her to travel across India, further enriching her theatrical journey.

Reflecting on her role as a woman in theater, she mentions how acting helped her confront power struggles, emotional turmoil, and societal injustices. She hopes that her performances inspire change.

Over her 22-year career, she collaborated with eminent Tamil playwrights and performed in critically acclaimed plays like Red Mirror and I Am Reading Savitribai. Stella has also acted in award-winning films, including Peranbu and Baaram.

Arivu is a groundbreaking Tamil rapper, lyricist, and musician, celebrated for his socially conscious lyrics and genre-defying artistry. Arivu first gained widespread recognition as a member of The Casteless Collective, a Chennai-based music ensemble that uses art as a platform for anti-caste activism. 












JAHNAVI PHALKEY

Dr Jahnavi Phalkey is the founding Director of Science Gallery, Bengaluru. She is also a filmmaker and historian of science and technology. In 2023, Jahnavi was awarded the Infosys Prize in Humanities for her brilliant insights into the individual, institutional, and material histories of scientific research in modern India.

Jahnavi was external curator to the Science Museum London, and has been a Scholar-in-Residence at the Deutsches Museum, Munich. She is the author of Atomic State: Big Science in Twentieth Century India and has coedited Science of Giants: China and India in the Twentieth Century. She is the producer-director of the documentary film Cyclotron.

Jahnavi read civics and politics at the University of Bombay and the School of Oriental and African Studies, London. She holds a doctoral degree in history of science and technology from the Georgia Institute of Technology, Atlanta.
















SHABNAM VIRMANI

Shabnam Virmani is a documentary film maker, artist, archivist, curator and writer. Currently an artist in residence at the Srishti school of art, design and technology. Her practice is an exploration of the philosophy of Kabir, Shah Abdul Latif Bhitai and other mystic poets.

Through a deep engagement with oral folk traditions for over two decades, her deep inspiration in poetry and its wisdom has taken the shape of four documentary films on Kabir, a digital archive called Ajab Shahar, writing books, curating and organizing urban festivals and rural yatras, and a program called Shabad Shaala to inspire students with the challenge and wonder of mystic poetry.

Her three published books are 'I Saw Myself: Journeys with Shah Abdul Latif Bhitai' (Penguin, 2019), 'One Palace. A Thousand Doorways: Songline through Bhakti, Sufi & Baul Oral Traditions' (Spealing Tiger, 2019) co-authored with Vipul Rikhi and 'Burn Down Your House: Provocations from Kabir' (Speaking Tiger, 2024). Her film 'Kabira Khada Bazaar Mein' won the Special Jury Prize at the 52nd National Awards in 2011.














SYNOPSIS OF THE FILM








AARTI KAWLRA

Aarti Kawlra has been the Academic Director of the Humanities Across Borders (HAB) programme since 2016. She has worked with HAB partners to develop spaces for trans-sectorial academia-society exchanges around the themes of 'place', 'practice', 'food' and 'stories' using situated learning methodologies at IIAS's experiential schools, practice-based workshops and consultative roundtable meetings.

Aarti is also affiliated to the Madras Institute of Development Studies (MIDS), Chennai where she is collaborating on a book project with a historian on the politics of craft-based, manual training in colonial south India.

Her book We Who Wove with Lotus Thread: Summoning Community in South India (Orient Blackswan, 2018) uses the methods of anthropology, social history and cultural studies to discursively interrogate colonial and postcolonial framings of culture, heritage, and development as they collide with artisanal self-representation in south India. Her experience in working with national and international craft advocacy groups and institutions (she co-founded an ethical craft production enterprise for women workers in rural Tamil Nadu in 2006), has helped shape the place and practice based pedagogical experiments of the HAB program.






About the filmmaker

R.R. Srinivasan is a versatile filmmaker, photographer, and writer who has significantly contributed to promoting film appreciation in South India. Through his involvement in the film society movement and alternative film journals, he made serious cinema accessible to a broader audience, especially in non-metropolitan areas. A key figure from the Kanchanai Film Society in Thirunelveli, Srinivasan introduced thought-provoking films to new viewers. He is also a guest lecturer on film, literature, and photography at various universities.

Srinivasan's work spans documentaries such as Close Your Eyes (1997), The Ruins (1998), Invisible Children (2003), Silk Route (2001), Corrupt Electricity (2016), and ADHICHANALLUR THAMIRABARANI CIVILIZATION (2021), among others. Recently, he has explored the intersection of cinema and visual anthropology, expanding his creative range. Through his documentaries, Srinivasan continues to address social, cultural, and historical themes, cementing his legacy as a leading figure in Indian documentary filmmaking.

About the filmmaker

Ravi Subramanian is a distinguished poet, short story writer, essayist, lyricist, composer, and filmmaker. He has authored six poetry collections, two essay collections, and four literary anthologies, with his works included in university syllabi for both bachelor's and postgraduate courses. His Tamil poems have been translated into eight languages, gaining international recognition.

Subramanian has received several prestigious awards, including the Honorary Emirates Literary Personality at Tamil University, the Ma. Aranganathan Lifetime Achievement Award, the Tamil Nadu Government Best Book Award, and the Bharathiyar Poetry Award.

Beyond his literary contributions, Subramanian serves as a jury member for eight major literary awards and has directed over 100 social-oriented films, including seven biographical documentaries. He also wrote and directed the short film Thamarai. As a composer, he has set to music 93 poems by modernist and ancient Tamil poets, further enriching Tamil culture with his creative output.

About the film

A.C.Tarciisius (b.1940) has been active as a theatre director, playwright and actor for more than six decades. He has evolved a unique style combining the traditional Eastern and modern Western theatrical forms. His contribution to the contemporary Tamil Theatre as a whole is remarkable. Now in his eighties, he continues to teach and inspire theatre artists.

This documentary has recorded his reminiscences, interviews of important theatre personalities, a nostalgic reunion with his longtime close associates and excerpts from theatre workshops recently conducted by him. It also has rare archival footage of his memorable plays. It was filmed in India, Sri Lanka and Europe.

About the filmmaker

Amshan Kumar is an acclaimed Indian filmmaker and writer with a deep passion for cinema. His 2015 National Film Award-winning documentary, Yazhpanan Thedchanamoorthy: Music Beyond Boundaries, remains the only Tamil non-fiction film to earn a National Award in the past 17 years. A respected writer, his book Cinema Rasanai, a comprehensive guide to film appreciation, is widely used as a textbook in universities.

Amshan's debut feature film, Oruththi, was selected for the prestigious 2003 International Film Festival of India, where it was showcased in the Indian Panorama section. His second film, Manusangada, was screened at both the 39th Cairo International Film Festival and the 48th International Film Festival of India in 2017, further solidifying his reputation in global cinema. Based in Chennai, Amshan continues to contribute significantly to the Indian and international film landscape.
